## The meeting of the 5th July 2022

This meeting was a talk given by me on the history of **Quartslab Marketing LTD** otherwise known as QSL LTD.

It originated in July 1974 it was registered as C&C Electronics and in May 1978 Quartslab Marketing Ltd, relocate to Ireland in 2006 returned to UK in and ceased trading in 2021. A span of 47 years, not many organisations last that long.

It's primary function was to supply Quartz Piezoelectric Crystals mainly (but not exclusively) to the communications industry.

In that time we supplied a mixture of international customers varying from the Military (the UK and USA plus some others that I won't go in to), government departments and many in the broadcast and entertainment industry.

We were major exporters to many companies round the world and saw many other companies supplying similar items cease to exist.

On the evening of giving the talk I had the benefit of having Dave Court (G3SDL, EI3IO, CT7AOU and various other call signs) with me. As Dave started the company with me and ran it when it relocated to Ireland he was able to do part of the talk.

I set up as usual on the picnic table in Eaglesfield Park on Shooters Hill. As I was on my own, I kept things simple with 18 ft of lightweight mast supporting a cut down Tonna beam with folded dipole feed. The radio was the FT897 sing its own internal battery packs which lasted well for the couple of hours I operated. Plenty of stations were worked on two metres, including continentals. I also worked some stations on six metres after fitting a dipole about 10 ft above ground.

Interestingly, a noise level on 2 metres which I thought was coming from a hilltop installation turned out to be from the sun as it moved around in line with it during the course of the afternoon. I have never previously experienced that effect. Solar activity must have been high.

Anyway, the club call sign got an airing and many familiar all signs were worked.

# **Droning On**

#### When the FCC issues a fine they really issue a serious one.

FCC issued a \$2.8 million fine against HobbyKing for marketing non compliant transmitters used to relay video from drones to amateur drone operators that could apparently operate on unauthorized radio frequencies and power levels. The operating frequencies of these drone TV transmitters near the 1.3 GHz amateur band as well as to both the interrogation and reply frequencies used for Air Traffic Control Air Route Surveillance "transponder" radar systems.

The investigation partly originated from a 2017 ARRL complaint that HobbyKing was selling drone transmitters that operated on amateur and non-amateur frequencies, in some instances marketing them as amateur radio equipment.

HobbyKing had denied that it was marketing its drone transmitters to US customers, but , ARRL Lab Manager Ed Hare, W1RFI, was able to purchase two drone transmitters from HobbyKing for testing in the ARRL Lab.

Some examples of FCC enforcement.

\$22,000 Fine Issued by FCC to Ham Radio Operator In Compliance News July 23, 2014 The Federal Communications Commission issued a \$22,000 fine for frequency hogging

The Federal Communications Commission is proposing to fine an amateur radio operator \$34,000 for alleged interference with firefighting efforts in Idaho last year.

An amateur radio licensee from Paterson, New Jersey was penalized \$ 25,000 for allegedly continuing to operate an unlicensed FM radio station.

#### In my recent visit to Florida I had a couple of minor "drone experiences".

I had to have a new roof fitted on the instructions of my insurance company. (Nothing wrong with the old one just a change of regulations.) To comply with the insurance company I had to get wind mitigation certification so employed the services of a local company who came along with a ladder and a drone.

They flew the drone over the property and took a number of photographs of the roof for the certification as well as climbing around in the loft. This was all supposed to get me a discount with the insurance company but that never happened.

The other experience was when I was out walking one night. I decided to walk to a local restaurant which was about 45 minutes away. On my return trip it was dark and the first part of the journey was in a well lit main road and the last part in some dark and very quiet back roads.

Walking along the quiet road I could hear a "droning" noise and saw a red and green light in the sky above me. It followed me along until I got to my destination where I waved to it and after a couple of dips it flew away.

I hope it was not operating on any illegal frequencies.

## **Crossness Pumping Station** a tribute to Victorian engineering

The Crossness Pumping Station is a former sewage pumping station designed by the Metropolitan Board of Works's chief engineer Sir Joseph Bazalgette and architect Charles Henry Driver. It is located at Crossness Sewage Treatment Works, at the eastern end of the Southern Outfall Sewer and the Ridgeway path in the London Borough of Bexley. Constructed between 1859 and 1865 by William Webster, as part of Bazalgette's redevelopment of the London sewerage system, it features spectacular ornamental cast ironwork, that Nikolaus Pevsner described as "a masterpiece of engineering – a Victorian cathedral of ironwork".


It is adjacent to Erith Marshes, a grazing marsh, the northern part of which is designated as Crossness Nature Reserve. This provides a valuable habitat for creatures ranging from moths to small amphibians and water voles.




Above the centre of the engine room

## **Roal Arsenal Narrow Guage Railway**



This locomotive usually carries people from the entrance to Crossness Sewage Works to the historic pumping station. Unfortunately it is broken in a very expensive way.

The original hydraulic drive motors fitted in 1986 and having clocked up 65,000 miles have failed and are beyond economic repair.

The new replacement motors are going to cost £10,000 and they are trying to raise this through crowdfunding.
