The Last Meeting

The last meeting was a talk by one of our members Kevin Packard G8MLO on the Vulcan Restoration Trust of which he is chairman.

The Avro Vulcan

The Avro Vulcan is a British jet-powered strategic bomber that was in service with the Royal Air Force (RAF) from the 1950s until 1984. It is most famous for its role during the Cold War as part of the RAF's nuclear deterrent force. Here are some key details about the Avro Vulcan:

The Vulcan's primary role was to carry and deliver nuclear weapons as part of the United Kingdom's nuclear deterrence strategy during the Cold War. It could carry nuclear bombs, including the Blue Steel stand-off missile, and it played a crucial role in the RAF's V-force, which was responsible for maintaining the country's nuclear deterrent.

The aircraft entered RAF service in the late 1950s and remained in service until 1984 when it was retired. It saw limited combat during the Falklands War in 1982 when Vulcan bombers carried out long range bombing missions against Argentine positions on the Falkland Islands.

The Avro Vulcan was known for its distinctive delta wing and a tailless, slender fuselage. It had a crew of five, including a pilot, co-pilot, navigator, radar operator, and air electronics officer. After its retirement from active service, a few Vulcan aircraft were preserved and maintained for air shows and public displays.

The last flying Vulcan, known as XH558, was operated by the Vulcan to the Sky Trust and conducted farewell flights until its final retirement in 2015.

The Avro Vulcan gained significant popularity and became an iconic symbol of British aviation history. It often drew crowds at air shows due to its distinctive appearance and impressive displays and unique sound which once heard was never forgotten.

Vulcan XL426 is an Avro Vulcan aircraft with a unique history. Here are some details about it.

XL426 is an Avro Vulcan B2 aircraft, which is a subtype of the Avro Vulcan bomber. It was part of the Royal Air Force's V-bomber fleet.

It was built in 1962 and served with the RAF until its retirement in 1986. During its operational service, it was primarily tasked with carrying and delivering nuclear weapons as part of the UK's strategic nuclear deterrent.

Preservation and Restoration:

After its retirement from military service, XL426 was acquired by the Vulcan Restoration Trust, an organization dedicated to preserving and maintaining Vulcan aircraft. The aircraft was restored to taxiing condition, allowing it to move on the ground but not to fly.

Maintenance and Fundraising:

Maintaining and displaying an aircraft like the Vulcan XL426 requires significant resources and funding. Many organizations rely on donations, sponsorships, and volunteers to keep these historic aircraft in good condition.


